# Quick Start: No Outdoor Space



The Bird-Friendly Spaces program has been designed so everyone can participate, regardless of the size of your space. Whether you have a dorm room or an apartment without a balcony, there are many actions you can take to help protect resident and migratory birds in our region. This guide provides tips on being bird-friendly in every space you occupy!

## CREATE INVITING HABITAT


Even if you do not have a yard to plant native plants or install a water feature, there are plenty of ways to be bird-friendly with no outdoor space!

- ✓ Plant natives in a pot right outside your doorway (*check out our plant suggestions*).
- ✓ Have conversations with your apartment or condo complex. Encourage them to remove invasive plants and start planting natives in their landscaping.
- ✓ Volunteer at invasive plant removal or habitat restoration workdays with a local organization (*check out some of our favorite spots on page 2*).
- ✓ Try out a bird feeder that attaches to your window via suction cup.
- ✓ Plant natives at a community garden.



### Natives Plants That Do Great in Pots:

**Turk's Cap**  
a flowering shrub that hummingbirds love



**Black-eyed Susan**  
a cheery yellow annual that blooms all summer

**Corpus Christi Fleabane**  
a low-growing daisy that drapes beautifully

**Lanceleaf Coreopsis**  
a beautiful yellow flower with evergreen leaves

**Texas Grama**  
a compact bunchgrass to provide structure



## LIMIT THREATS TO BIRDS

Resident and migratory birds face a number of threats, especially in an urban environment. You can take actions in your own space to limit these threats and help all the wildlife of our region.

- ✓ Buy bird-friendly items like shade-grown coffee.
- ✓ Turn off all non-essential outdoor lighting at night, especially during migration seasons.
- ✓ Keep your cats indoors (or supervise their outdoor adventures with leashes or catios).
- ✓ Prevent daytime window collisions by using decals, screens, or other visual cues for birds.
- ✓ Limit your use of single-use plastics.
- ✓ Participate in a litter clean-up in your neighborhood.
- ✓ Avoid using pesticides or rodenticides.
